Free paper submissions: instructions for authors

CORRESPONDING AUTHOR: The contact address, telephone number and email address of the corresponding author should be detailed as a separate paragraph preceding the title (and duplicated on the accompanying email).

TITLE: The abstract should begin with the title, and full name and affiliations of all the authors.

THE ABSTRACT: (excluding titles authors and affiliations) should not exceed 250 words. In addition, up to 3 reference and one table **or** figure can be included.

All abstracts must be submitted electronically as *.doc email attachments to nas2010@nuh.nhs.uk. All copy - including footnotes, legends, tables and references must be Times New Roman 12 point double spaced. Text must not be boxed or enclosed in any other kind of submission.

Abstracts must have the following subheadings in bold: *Introduction, Methods, Results, Conclusions, References and acknowledgements.*

Case reports must be submitted under the headings: *Introduction, case history and discussion.*

FIGURES: Cite the figure in the text and submit on a separate sheet. **Do not embed within the text.**

Digital figures: Electronic art must be submitted as a TIFF (tagged image file format), a PPT (Power Point) file or an EPS (encapsulated postscript) file. Accepted line art must have a resolution of at least 1200 dpi (dots per inch), and electronic photographs, radiographs, CT scans, and scanned images must have a resolution of at least 300 dpi. If fonts are used in the artwork, they must be converted to paths or outlines or they must be embedded in the files. Please note that artwork generated from office suite programs such as Corel Draw, and MS Word, and artwork downloaded from the Internet (JPEG or GIF files), cannot be processed for publication.

TABLES: Cite table in the text and submit on a separate sheet. **Do not embed within the text.** Include the table title, appropriate column heads, and explanatory legends (including definitions of any abbreviations used). They should be self-explanatory and should supplement, rather than duplicate, the material in the text.
